


Make airplane following numbered

More time?


Ask kids to look at page 2 of their leaflet. Find out about Goliath's height compared to others'. There's a math problem to solve, too!


1 Samuel 17:34-37

STORY AT A GLANCE -

David

- Anointed by Samuel to be the next king of Israel while King Saul was still in power. (1 Sam 16:11-13).
- Young shepherd, did not go to war like older brothers; brought supplies to them in battle.
- Became Saul's parttime armor-bearer (1 Sam 16:21).
- While wearing Saul's armor seemed like a good plan, David trusted the living God and the abilities God gave him instead (1 Sam 17:31-40).





- It only took one stone to silence Goliath's boasting: many have wondered why David chose five.

King Saul

- · Relied on David to provide musical therapy during his times of spiritual distress. (1 Sam 16:14-23).
- Offered riches, freedom, and his daughter's hand in marriage as a prize to anyone who could kill Goliath.

Israelite Army



• Deployed to push back a Philistine invasion into Judah.

Philistine Army



- Sea people who became Israel's greatest rivals.
- They are still remembered in the word Palestine.

DISCOVER

Get Ready

Identify each tool with the kids and ask:

- Which ones do you know how to use?
- What kinds of jobs are they for?
- How old were you when you learned how to use them?
- Tell me about a time you used one of them.

Introduce the Characters

- · King Saul is the first king God chose for Israel. He leads his army against the Philistines, one of Israel's most powerful enemies.
- Goliath is the largest Philistine warrior. He's a bully who is used to getting his own way and doesn't believe in God.
- David is a shepherd—the same shepherd God chose and Samuel anointed to become the next king.
- There are 2 armies. The Israelites believe in God. The Philistines don't.
- Each of these characters has different tools for their own jobs. Some think that weapons are what's needed to defeat an army.











Play the David & Goliath Video



Watch for what David decided to use to defeat Goliath, HINT: It's something he already has!

- What tools did David use that weren't weapons? How could these kind of tools help you?

Open the Connect Bible

Help kids find and mark 1 Samuel 17:34-37 on page 335.

• There are 2 Old Testament books that feature the history of Samuel, Saul, and David: 1 Samuel and 2 Samuel. Read the words Saul says to David at the end of verse 37, and say them out loud to each other at the end of class today.


Do the 1 Samuel 17:1-52 Connect Bible activity on page 334.


• Read verses 4 and 23. Goliath's name begins with the same letter as the name of the town he is from. What is it? (It rhymes with path.) After David became king and head of the Israelite army, Gath was one of the towns he attacked and captured.



Holy Moly!


Give kids time to imagine, and help them reflect.

Assemble the stand.


