#### These instructions

will help your group build an arch out of your own bodies.



First, two people should stand facing each other and pressing their palms together (like they're giving each other a "high-ten"), and slide their feet back as far as possible without losing their balance.

Next, have a volunteer GENTLY pull down on the arch-peoples' arms. How can you make this arch stronger?

Idea: Have two more people sit tightly behind the arch-peoples' feet to create buttresses. What other ideas can you come up with?





Get together with your family, and read the text from today's lesson. Ask each other some of these questions:

- Who's someone on TV or in a movie that you think is cool? Why?
- What about someone who is a "bad guy?" What makes you want to reject them?

Next, find a TV show you can pause, or a DVD with a person like this in it. With your parents' help, put some plastic cling-wrap onto the screen to cover this person's face, and use markers to add some features to their face to make them look a little funny or silly. Ask:

- Why do you think Jesus was rejected in today's story? How do we reject Jesus sometimes?
- How would our behavior be different if we saw ourselves in the people we don't like?
- Why is it a good idea to picture ourselves as both the "good" and the "bad" characters in parables like this one?


